BE IT RESOLVED, that upon the recommendation of the Superintendent of Schools, the Rocky Point Union Free School District will enter into an agreement to participate in the BOCES Cooperative Bidding Services Purchasing Contracts for the 2012-2013 fiscal year on an "as needed" basis as per the following Joint Municipal Cooperative Bidding Program Resolution:

WHEREAS, various educational and municipal corporations located within the State of New York desire to bid jointly for generally needed services and standardized supply and equipment items; and

WHEREAS, the Rocky Point Union Free School District, an educational/municipal corporation (hereinafter the "Participant") is desirous of selectively participating with other educational and/or municipal corporations in the State of New York in joint bidding in the areas mentioned above pursuant to General Municipal Law § 119-o and Education Law Section 1950; and

WHEREAS, the Participant is a municipality within the meaning of General Municipal Law §119-n and is eligible to participate in the Board of Cooperative Educational Services, First Supervisory District of Suffolk County (hereinafter Eastern Suffolk BOCES) Joint Municipal Cooperative Bidding Program (hereinafter the "Program") in the areas mentioned above; and

WHEREAS, the Participant acknowledges receipt of the Program description inclusive of Eastern Suffolk BOCES' standard bid packet and the general conditions relating to said Program; and

WHEREAS, with respect to all activities conducted by the Program, the Participant wishes to delegate to Eastern Suffolk BOCES the responsibility for drafting of bid specifications, advertising for bids, accepting and opening bids, tabulating bids, awarding the bids, and reporting the results to the Participant.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Participant hereby appoints Eastern Suffolk BOCES to represent it and to act as the lead agent in all matters related to the Program as described above; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Participant hereby authorizes Eastern Suffolk BOCES to place all legal advertisements for any required cooperative bidding in *Newsday*, which is designated as the official newspaper for the Program; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a Participant Meeting shall be held annually consisting of a representative from each Program Participant. Notice of the meeting shall be given to each representative at least five (5) days prior to such meeting; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that an Advisory Committee will be formed consisting of five to ten representatives of Program participants for a term of three (3) years as authorized by General Municipal Law §119-0.2.j.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Agreement with the Participant shall be for a term of one (1) year as authorized by General Municipal Law §119-o.2.j.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Participant agrees to pay Eastern Suffolk BOCES an annual fee as determined annually by Eastern Suffolk BOCES to act as the lead agent for the Program.

MINUTES ROCKY POINT PUBLIC SCHOOLS BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETING February 13, 2012

Mr. Nofi called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. in the library of the Frank J. Carasiti Elementary School.

Pledge of Allegiance

Mr. Nofi invited Dr. Ring to begin the meeting with the Superintendent's Report.

Dr. Ring announced the second budget workshop meeting for the 2012-2013 school year was conducted at 5:30 p.m. in room 135 of the Frank J. Carasiti Elementary School. Dr. Ring further announced the third and final budget workshop meeting, prior to the final full budget Public Hearing scheduled for May 1, 2012, would be held at the next scheduled Board of Education Meeting, March 26, 2012, commencing at 7 p.m.

Dr. Ring offered congratulations to the Varsity Cheerleaders upon their first place win at the National High School Cheerleading Championship Competition. Dr. Ring noted this is the second consecutive national title won by the Rocky Point Varsity Cheerleaders.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

Mrs. Susan Sullivan, Assistant Principal, Rocky Point High School

- The well-attended annual Patriotic Concert was held on February 2, 2012. The concert featured a world premiere performance by contemporary American composer, Nick Page, entitled "Many Ways to Serve" as well as music honoring our nation's history and the service of the men and women of the Armed Forces. Members of the high school band, orchestra and the choruses from each school concluded the concert with a performance of "United We Stand."
- Second quarter report cards were posted to the parent portal on February 3rd.
- The guidance department will be hosting a college information night beginning at 7:00 p.m. on February 16th in the auditorium.

- This year's musical production is West Side Story. Performances are scheduled for March 1st, 2nd, and 3rd at 7:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium. Tickets are \$10.00 each and will be on sale at the high school ticket booth before and after school and on the evenings just before the show. A free performance for all senior citizens will be held on Wednesday, February 29th at 3:30 p.m.
- The Rocky Point Marching Band will again participate in the annual St. Patrick's Day Parade on Sunday, March 11th.

Dr. Scott O'Brien, Principal, Rocky Point Middle School

- On behalf of the Rocky Point Middle School, Dr. O'Brien congratulated Anna Spallina, staff member and Varsity Cheerleader coach, and the entire Varsity Cheerleading squad upon their first place accomplishment at the National High School Cheerleading Championship Competition.
- Report cards were posted to the parent portal as the second semester of the school year has begun.
- The middle school play this year is *Beauty and the Beast*. Performances will begin in March.
- Students attended the winter dance sponsored by the Student Government.
- Following the Rachel's Challenge program, the Friends of Rachel Club continues to be a huge success.
- All students participated in an assembly presentation by Detective Graziano of the Suffolk County Cyber Crimes Unit on February 6th. Detective Graziano spoke to the students about internet safety and cyber bullying and provided them with the most current information about how to keep safe using the internet.
- The Rocky Point Middle School Student Government is sponsoring Spirit Week.
 Students will be showing their school spirit by wearing school colors and other fun spirit-related themes.
- Parent Orientation for incoming sixth grade students will be held on March 8th at 6:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium. Current fifth grade students will visit the middle school later this school year for the student portion of the sixth grade orientation.

Mr. Joseph Tapler, Assistant Principal, Joseph A. Edgar School

- Mr. Tapler noted Mrs. Tvelia was unable to attend the meeting this evening due to illness and that he would present the building report in her absence.
- As part of the Parents as Reading Partners program, staff members of JAE
 participated in the Great Reading Switch, wherein staff members rotated into
 classrooms other than their own in order to read aloud to different students. Mr.
 Tapler thanked school library media specialist, Mrs. DiGiovanni, for organizing
 the event.
- On February 14th, third grade students will participate in the annual Valentine Soiree. The children will exchange Valentines, make a craft, enjoy a special snack, and participate in line dancing. Parent volunteers, one from each class, are arranging for the music and helping out in the classrooms.

- The annual penny-a-page reading program, Prime Time, and the Madagascar-Ankizay Fund raised more than \$2,200 to support education of the children of Madagascar.
- The Jump Rope for Heart fundraiser took place on February 9th. Under the direction or Ms. Amoscato, Ms. Famighetti and Mr. Camarda, students are encouraged to exercise and to help others through their donations. The children solicited pledges from friends and family and then participated in jump roping, hula hooping and other physical activities for two hours after school. This year, more than one hundred and fifty students participated and through their efforts raised \$7.761.86 for the American Heart Association.
- The annual Joseph A. Edgar St. Patrick Senior Citizen Breakfast will be held on March 16th from 8 a.m. to 10 a.m. in the JAE cafeteria.

Mrs. Virginia Kelly-Gibbons, Principal, Frank J. Carasiti Elementary School

- The Parents as Reading Partners began this month. Each night, students read a book, poem or magazine with a parent or special person in their family. Each day, team standings were announced. Following the morning Pledge of Allegiance, a parent and child read a poem over the load speaker for the enjoyment of all. Story Night was a well-attended success. Parents and children, clad in pajamas, enjoyed readings by Mrs. Kelly-Gibbons and Dr. Herbert. Thank you to the PTA and all the helpers who served the children hot chocolate and cookies in the cafeteria. The PARP finale featured a joint pancake breakfast with JAE. The breakfast was held on Saturday, February 11th, with the teachers preparing the pancakes and the students enjoying the game of bingo with family members.
- On February 10th students marked the one hundredth day of school. Students and parent volunteers celebrated with literacy and math activities.
- Teachers have been assessing their students in order to prepare mid-year report cards.
- Random Acts of Kindness is this week. The second grade service squad brainstorms ideas each day after the morning announcements.
- Broccoli Rob will perform again this year at two assemblies in order to spread the word about the importance of healthy eating habits and good nutrition.
- Both the Science Club and the Garden Club have been meeting regularly.
- Referencing the upcoming February break, Mrs. Kelly-Gibbons extended her best wishes for an enjoyable mid-winter recess.

Mr. Nofi opened the floor to questions and/or comments.

 Mrs. Therese King expressed her disappointment that the upcoming retirements of Susan Sullivan, William Caulfield and Carol Tvelia were not announced at last month's meeting. Mrs. King extended her gratitude to the retiring administrators as both a parent and a community member for their years of service to the students. Mr. Nofi thanked Mrs. King for her comments and advised that Mrs. Sullivan, Mr. Caulfield and Ms. Tvelia would be honored and recognized for their

- many contributions at the May 15, 2012 board meeting, as is customary, along with any other retirees who have not yet announced their intentions to retire.
- Mrs. Intravaia informed the board of her daughter's continued regression. Mrs.
 Intravaia stated she will be in attendance at the monthly board meetings until her concerns are resolved. Mr. Nofi responded to Mrs. Intravaia's comments and stated the ongoing issue was currently being addressed by the state.
- Mrs. Donna McCauley, reading from a prepared statement, recounted an alleged school bus incident that occurred on Friday, February 10th, Mrs. McCauley expressed her dissatisfaction with the manner in which the incident was handled by school personnel. Mrs. McCauley posed a list of questions pertaining to district policies and procedures concerning school bus protocol and subsequent disciplinary actions to be imposed upon those allegedly involved. Mr. Nofi expressed his appreciation to Mrs. McCauley for bringing the issue to the attention of the board. Mr. Nofi advised he was aware of the incident and that the district office administration and building administration had investigated the issue. Mr. Nofi stated that the current student bus-riding policy has been in place since the inception of the Rocky Point Middle School. Mr. Nofi advised the district would research and gather information concerning possible bus changes in order to evaluate the impact such changes would present. Dr. Ring reported the building principals devoted a great deal of time in investigating this incident and that the investigation was handled appropriately. Dr. Ring advised of his intention to speak with the building principals and ask that they bring the bus concerns to the attention of staff members and the Shared Decision Making Team for discussion and review. Dr. Ring further advised that he would check the New York State Education Commissioner's regulations pertaining to the permissibility of denying transportation to students solely due to a student attending detention even if that detention is not the result of a transportation related disciplinary matter. Mrs. Burke inquired about the procedures students needed to follow in order to be able to board an after-school bus. Dr. Ring provided the particulars in response to this inquiry.
- Mr. and Mrs. McCauley and Mrs. Intravaia asked for specifics concerning the punishments doled out to the students involved in the alleged incident. Dr. Ring advised he was legally unable to comment upon student disciplinary matters. Mrs. McCauley inquired if there was a standard of punishment in place for infractions committed by students. Dr. Ring responded there were no "sentencing guidelines" of specific discipline for specific infractions. Dr. Ring advised that appropriate disciplinary measures and sanctions are at the discretion of the building principals by policy and by law.
- Dr. Ring pointed out it would be wrong to assume that the allegations brought forth and discussed at this meeting did actually occur as presented. Once again, Dr. Ring reported that a thorough investigation was done and that the disciplinary actions taken by the principals were appropriate.
- Mrs. Burke asked for clarification of the district's obligations to notify parents about possible health concerns resulting from exposure to unknown contaminants.
- Mrs. Hrysko stated it was her understanding that the bus driver returned the bus to school and asked for the particulars concerning the reason for this action. Mr.

Nofi remarked that this dialogue was not appropriate in this forum as this was a student disciplinary matter. Mr. Nofi stated he supported Dr. Ring's suggestion that further conversations with the administrators in both the high school and the middle school would be helpful. Following extensive discussion, Mr. Nofi acknowledged a procedural error was made by the individual who met the bus upon its return to school in allowing the students on the bus to leave the premises without being brought to the attention of administrative staff.

- An unidentified meeting attendee shared that she was a parent whose daughter was on the bus during the alleged incident. The parent reported Dr. O'Brien responded immediately to her e-mail in which she voiced her concerns and raised questions regarding the bus incident. In addition, the meeting attendee expressed her concerns with possible retaliatory actions being taken against students called to the office over the public address system in connection with the bus incident. Mr. Nofi thanked her for her comments and expressed his confidence in Dr. O'Brien and his team's response to the situation.
- A meeting attendee inquired about the specifics of the district's Code of Conduct and the progressive disciplinary procedures. In response, Dr. Ring offered the disciplinary guidelines as outlined in the Code of Conduct.
- An unidentified meeting attendee stated that he was a member of the Shared Decision Making Team for seven years and suggested that a collaboration of both the RPHS and RPMS Shared Decision Making Teams would be beneficial in situations such as this.
- Mr. Nofi thanked everyone for their comments and related that he shared the
 concerns of those who spoke. Mr. Nofi confirmed that the comments expressed by
 meeting attendees would be taken under advisement and reviewed by the district
 administration.
- Mrs. Beth Dimino expressed her appreciation to the faculty and staff of Rocky Point Schools. Mrs. Dimino announced both her children were college graduates and credited her children's academic successes to all of the teachers of Rocky Point Schools and Mr. Anthony Nobre and Mr. Gerald Maggi, specifically. Mrs. Dimino commented that she was unable to attend the budget workshop but wished to strongly encourage the board and the administration to keep AP courses and extra-curricular activities available to the students as they are helpful for scholarships. In addition, Mrs. Dimino stressed the importance of keeping the Rocky Point Teachers Association and the School Related Professional Association intact because of their invaluable contributions to the students of the district. Mr. Nofi thanked Mrs. Dimino for her comments and advised that both the budget workshop presentations from the January 13th meeting and this evening's meeting were available to be viewed on the district's website. Mr. Nofi affirmed that he and all of the board trustees were committed to maintaining the excellence of the Rocky Point School District. Mr. Nofi also noted that the district has limited resources and that difficult times and decisions lie ahead.
- An unidentified meeting attendee commented that the district has deteriorated from the time her children attended school up to the present time during which her grandchildren are in attendance. The meeting attendee said the district's "crunching of numbers" is adversely affecting the special education students.

There were no further questions or comments.



WHEREAS, the Participant acknowledges receipt of the Program description inclusive of Eastern Suffolk BOCES' standard bid packet and the general conditions relating to said Program; and

WHEREAS, with respect to all activities conducted by the Program, the Participant wishes to delegate to Eastern Suffolk BOCES the responsibility for drafting of bid specifications, advertising for bids, accepting and opening bids, tabulating bids, awarding the bids, and reporting the results to the Participant.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Participant hereby appoints Eastern Suffolk BOCES to represent it and to act as the lead agent in all matters related to the Program as described above; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Participant hereby authorizes Eastern Suffolk BOCES to place all legal advertisements for any required cooperative bidding in Newsday, which is designated as the official newspaper for the Program; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a Participant Meeting shall be held annually consisting of a representative from each Program Participant. Notice of the meeting shall be given to each representative at least five (5) days prior to such meeting; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that an Advisory Committee will be formed consisting of five to ten representatives of Program Participants for a term of three (3) years as authorized by General Municipal Law §119-o.2.j.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Agreement with the Participant shall be for a term of one (1) year as authorized by General Municipal Law §119-0.2.j.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Participant agrees to pay Eastern Suffolk BOCES an annual fee as determined annually by Eastern Suffolk BOCES to act as the lead agent for the Program.

PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Joint Municipal Cooperative Bidding Program - CoSer 612

Description of the Program

Cooperative Bidding is an optimal method of bidding that Eastern Suffolk BOCES can offer to local school districts and other municipalities. By using the Eastern Suffolk BOCES Joint Municipal Cooperative Bidding Program (hereinafter the "Program"), school districts, and other municipalities (hereinafter "Participants") may realize significant time allocation and cost savings within their purchasing functions. This method of bidding allows Participants to join with Eastern Suffolk BOCES to coordinate some or all of their bidding needs by cooperatively bidding goods and services for their mutual benefit. Eastern Suffolk BOCES will assign a Program Coordinator to administer the Program. The Program is offered pursuant to General Municipal Law §119-0 and Education Law §1950.

Benefits of the Program

Participants may benefit from Cooperative Bidding activities with Eastern Suffolk BOCES in many ways, including the following:

- Lower administrative costs: By providing coordination of membership activity, bid preparation
 and analysis, legal advertisements, bid recommendations, intercession on vendor
 issues/complaints, researching vendors, etc. Eliminating duplication of efforts, Participants
 realize significant savings in time, labor and money;
- 2. Improved response from vendors: Vendors maximize bidding on larger quantities and are encouraged to compete for the Bid award. In addition, the bid solicitation potentially attracts a broader range of vendors. Greater competition leads to lower bid prices;
- 3. **Better product specifications:** Combining the knowledge and experience of all Participants in the Program and conducting Ad-Hoc Committees to review these specifications results in developing better bid specifications for goods and services; and
- 4. **Better compliance with State statutes on purchasing:** Since many purchases are subject to competitive bidding, Cooperative Bidding activities coordinated by Eastern Suffolk BOCES will foster easier compliance with bidding statutes and produce heightened awareness of legal requirements.

Participation in the Program

1. Participation in the Program must be evidenced by the adoption of either of the two attached Joint Municipal Cooperative Bidding Program Resolutions (Resolution A and Resolution B) by the governing body of the Participant before its acceptance to the Program. A Participant enrolling in the Program must file said resolution with Eastern Suffolk BOCES by July 31st of the school year in which it wishes to participate in awards of the Program.

- 2. The costs of operation of the Program will be prorated and will be paid by the Participant to Eastern Suffolk BOCES as an annual fee.
- 3. Eastern Suffolk BOCES shall act as the lead agency for Program Participants. Eastern Suffolk BOCES shall be responsible for drafting of bid specifications, advertising for bids pursuant to General Municipal Law § 103, accepting and opening bids, tabulating bids, either recommending or awarding the bids dependent upon which resolution is filed, and reporting the results to the Participants.
- 4. A Program Participants meeting shall be held annually to discuss the Program, its bids, vendors and/or issues in an open forum.
- 5. An Advisory Committee shall be formed pursuant to a nomination from Program Participants.
- 6. Bids will be developed by Eastern Suffolk BOCES based upon categories determined pursuant to applicable procedures.
- 7. Eastern Suffolk BOCES will place all legal advertisements for such Cooperative Bidding in Newsday, which shall be designated as the official newspaper for the Program.
- 8. Bids received before the designated time for opening will remain sealed and confidential until the designated time for opening. Sealed envelopes containing the bids will be stamped to indicate the date, time, and place of receipt. A bidder may seek to change his/her bid before the bids are opened. If this occurs, there will be no objection on the part of the Program Coordinator, provided the revised bids are received prior to the time and date specified in the bid opening. Bids received after the time and date specified for bid opening shall be refused and returned to the bidder.
- 9. Awards will be recommended and/or made by Eastern Suffolk BOCES to the lowest responsive, responsible bidder who meets the specifications. Participants that elect not to delegate awarding authority to Eastern Suffolk BOCES are responsible for making all bid awards through their governing body.
- 10. Participants in the Program shall issue their own purchase orders when purchasing from an award of the Program and accept full responsibility for all payments due the vendor relating to said purchase orders.
- 11. Eastern Suffolk BOCES, as the lead agent, will comply with notice requirements imposed by New York State Labor Law § 220 after awarding a public works contract. All Participants utilizing such an award are also individually responsible for notifying the Department of Labor of the name and address of the contractor, the date a contract was let, and the consideration stipulated in the contract, as well as following any other prevailing wage laws.
- 12. Participants in the Program may not deviate from the terms of the bid specifications when utilizing an award of the Program and will notify Eastern Suffolk BOCES of any material deviations by the vendor from the bid specifications.

Analysis of Current Status of Student Achievement and Program Effectiveness

ELA Core Instruction Findings:

ELA student achievement data (school-wide and disaggregated by grade and major student subgroups);

Grade 3:

81/244 or 33% of 3rd graders were not proficient on the 2011 ELA. 36/41 or 88% of Students with Disabilities were not proficient.

Grade 4:

89/251 or 36% of 4th graders were not proficient. 38/45 of 84% of Students with Disabilities were not proficient.

Grade 5:

110/276 or 40% of 5th graders were not proficient. 52/58 or 90% of SWD Students with Disabilities were not proficient.

Grades 3-5:

280/771 or 36% of students in grades 3-5 were not proficient on the ELA at JAE. 126/144 or 88% of Students with Disabilities in grades 3-5 were not proficient.

Since data analysis indicates that more than one-third or 36% of students in grades 3-5 and 88% of Students with Disabilities did not meet proficiency on the ELA assessment this past year, additional attention is being paid to students at- risk of not passing the 2012 ELA Assessment. As 54/59 or 92% of Students with Disabilities received Level 1 on the ELA, we are closely monitoring Students with Disabilities.

The disaggregated 3-5 ELA Assessment data for Students with Disabilities display weaknesses in New York State English Language Arts Learning Standards 1, 2, and 3. To address these deficits, as well as meet the demands of the new Common Core Learning Standards, instruction in third through fifth grade will focus on using specific evidence and textual support, building vocabulary knowledge and usage, identifying main idea and details, and strengthening command of Standard English grammar.

Further analysis of assessment data for SWD in grades 3 through 5 revealed the following information:

✓ New York State Grades 3-5 ELA Assessments

- There are approximately 41-58 SWD students per grade level
- 10-12% or 5-7 SWD per grade level passed the 2011 ELA
- SWD perform under 60% on all three standards
- SWD perform under 55% on Standard 3
- Gaps are demonstrated by JAE SWD compared to Suffolk County SWD

- A comparison of Rocky Point SWD and Suffolk County SWD revealed the following lower achievement for Rocky Point students:
 - ✓ Grade 3 ELA: Rocky Point = 12% Proficient Suffolk County = 22% Proficient

Gap of -10%

✓ Grade 4 ELA: Rocky Point = 16% Proficient

Suffolk County = 19% Proficient

Gap of -4%

- ✓ Grade 5 ELA: Rocky Point = 10% Proficient Suffolk County = 17% Proficient Gap of -7%
- In comparison to Suffolk County SWD, JAE SWD demonstrated gaps in 3rd and 4th grade on the extended response items: 3rd grade -5%, 4th grade -12%
- Students in Grades 3 and 4, demonstrated difficulty in Standard 2 in the following skill area:
 - ✓ using specific evidence from stories to describe themes, characters, their actions, their
 motivations; relating sequence of events
- Students in Grade 5, demonstrated difficulty in Standard 3 and extended response items in the following skill area:
 - evaluation of information, ideas, opinions, and themes in texts by identifying a central idea and supporting details

√ AIMSweb Grades 3-5 ELA

RCBM: The Reading Curriculum-Based Measurement (R-CBM) is an overall measure of students' general reading proficiency

- SWD exhibit weak fluency levels across all three grade levels
- During January 2012 testing administration, the test administrators observed weaknesses in SWD sight vocabulary during the oral reading

MAZE: Maze reading (Maze-CBM) is a corroborative or supplemental measure to provide a more complete picture of students' reading skills, especially when comprehension problems are suspected.

- SWD exhibit weak comprehension across all three grade levels
- AIMS data reveals that SWD's are making slight growth towards predicted targets, however, their growth rate is 50% lower than the general education population towards the same target
- The SWD growth rate is less than ½ of the target growth rate
- Although SWD showed growth, it was not sufficient to close the gap, which may actually be widening

AIMSweb data from September 2011 to January 2012 indicate that SWD are demonstrating progress in ELA. Data charts indicate that SWD have gained fluency on average of 20 words per minute from the fall to winter benchmarks; however, they still fall, approximately 30 words per minute below the target point for each grade level. Average growth rate per week should be 1.2 words per minute, SWD are growing at an average of .08 words per minute.

√ ThinkLink Grades 3-5

- Data mirrors New York State assessment results
- Data used as a predictor, as well as a skills deficiency identifier
- Deficits are seen in Standards 2 and 3
- ThinkLink assessments are administered without testing modifications
- SWD's had difficulty completing all 35 questions within the allotted time of 50 minutes
- On Test A, many SWD left the last one-third of the test items unanswered
- By Test C, most SWD do complete all test items

- CTD SWD benchmark reading levels in May for grade 4 are at L/M (beginning grade 3), which is at least one year below grade level
- Self-contained SWD benchmark reading levels are at J/K (end of Grade 2) or almost two years below grade level.
- These gaps, which have been identified in incoming grade 3 students continue through grade 5

Results on ThinkLink, a standardized assessment given to students three times per year, demonstrate similar deficiencies as the NYSED Grades 3-5 ELA Assessments. Further, Think Link, AIMSweb, and classroom assessment data indicate that Students with Disabilities have deficits with vocabulary and complex language acquisition, as well as with understanding and using complex and compound sentences in their written and oral language.

In addition, based on AIMSweb, SLOSSON, and Schlegel results, classroom instruction during the 2011-1012 school year is focusing on enhancing students' decoding and fluency skills. Teachers continue to implement web-based, skills specific ThinkLink probes to provide targeted individual instruction to students based on specific reading skill deficiencies. AIMSweb progress monitoring probes will provide us with individual formative assessment data to guide student instruction.

ELA Core Instruction Findings:

FEEDER SCHOOL: Frank J. Carasiti Elementary School: Kindergarten – Grade 2

We also conducted data analysis of assessments in our feeder school, Frank J. Carasiti Elementary School, which services students in the Rocky Point Union Free School District in Kindergarten through second grade. We looked at 2011 end-of year data for 275 students in second grade, our current third grade students in Joseph A. Edgar Intermediate School, as well as the mid-year data for our current second grade students.

- > Pull-out services impact instructional time in literacy, as well as other content area instruction
- ➤ Weekly pull-outs range from 3-5 days/week
- > Students can be out of the classroom from 30 to 240 minutes/week
- > Increase in SWD receiving speech services
- > Student attendance rate appears to be consistent at 95%
- > Increase in poverty rate from 17% to 20% over the past three years

ANALYSIS OF FACTORS THAT IMPACT SWD STUDENT PERFORMANCE IN ELA:

After reviewing, discussing, and analyzing the list of indicators of effective practice provided in the CEP Guidance Manual, the Rocky Point UFSD CEP Team determined that the indicators identified below are most critical to Joseph A. Edgar Intermediate School's improvement. The District and JAE plan to review and discuss these effective practices during professional development periods, grade level meetings, department meetings, and faculty meetings. The integration of these effective research based practices into professional practice, teaching, and learning will assist us as we work to strengthen the literacy skills of special education, ELL, and at-risk learners so that they can become proficient readers and writers in English Language Arts.

I. CURRICULUM

- 1. There is a written district level curriculum that is aligned with NY State standards, performance indicators and core competencies that forms the basis for all classroom instruction.
- 2. The local curriculum is articulated across grades/buildings to ensure that all skills and strategies are explicitly taught.
- 3. All students, including at-risk populations, are expected to meet all NY State standards.
- 4. The curriculum and learning units are challenging, highly engaging, and clearly linked to the standards and strategies being taught.
- 5. Extended school day programs focused on academic improvement are aligned with the local curriculum, and there is a process in place for communication between regular classroom teachers and after school staff.

II. INSTRUCTION

- 1. Classroom organization is flexible including, as appropriate, whole group instruction/work (lecture, whole group activity), small group instruction/work (such as individual or paired learning, work centers in use, cooperative/collaborative learning, individual tutoring/conferencing, and direct instruction of small group).
- 2. Co-teaching and team teaching strategies are flexible with all staff working together equitably.
- 3. Lesson plans/instruction reflect Scientifically Based Research/best practices, and the culture and languages of the student populations.
- 4. Lesson plans are based on district curriculum/ State standards.
- 5. Teachers work together to improve instruction.
- 6. Learning goals/standards are clear to students.
- 7. Students are actively engaged in learning.
- 8. The classroom has a positive, supportive environment for student learning.
- 9. There is evidence of effective use of best practices in instructional strategies/focus on student learning including: direct instruction, differentiated instruction, modeling/teacher-guided practice, scaffolding, experimental/hands-on learning, lessons beginning with activating/engaging strategies, content-area literacy (reading/writing), evidence of high level questioning strategies, linking new content to students' prior knowledge/interests, and student use of goals/rubrics.

While the majority of teachers will continue to use the Literacy Collaborative Framework to provide literacy instruction, some teachers will also use two additional reading programs this year. Students who received a level score of 1 or 2 on the ELA and cannot decode will participate in System 44, while students who can decode will participate in Read 180 (paid for by funds from IDEA Part B Section 611 Sub Grant). Other students will participate in Wilson Fundations or the Wilson Language Program. Students will be assessed to determine which program will best suit their individual needs. Providing these scientifically research based reading intervention programs to students will enable us to differentiate instruction based upon student needs.

We expanded our English Language Arts Program this year. We now have a scheduled 2-hour Literacy Block (uninterrupted except for occasional mandated support services such as Speech, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, English as a Second Language, social skills training, and education and autism counseling itinerant services) for students in grades three through five. To minimize the range of reading levels and target instruction during the this two-hour literacy block, Students with Disabilities in self-contained classes are now grouped for instruction based on reading level regardless of age or grade level. CTD students are clustered within the general education classes based on reading levels, different CTD classes have slightly higher/lower cluster reading levels.

We integrated *Core Knowledge Libraries*, which include social studies, science, and math content area reading texts during English Language Arts instruction across all classrooms in grades 3-5. Additionally, all teachers also integrated *Laura Robb Libraries*, which include fictional and informational leveled texts into Guided Reading instruction. Teachers will also continue to use webbased, skills specific ThinkLink probes to provide targeted individual instruction to students based on specific reading skill deficiencies.

The instructional program in English Language Arts for all students in grades 3-5 during the two-hour literacy block includes the following scientifically research based core instructional programs and strategies:

In addition, the instructional program for Students with Disabilities in self-contained and some ESL classes will include System 44 and the Wilson Language Program to support students' phonics needs to improve fluency and ultimately comprehension. Both programs are scientifically researched based foundational reading and phonics intervention programs for the most challenged

readers. Students who have mastered decoding will focus specifically on comprehension through READ 180, a scientifically researched based reading intervention program, which integrates reading, writing, and technology on a daily basis.

Although there are additional students in Consultant Teacher Direct (CTD) classes in grades 3 to 5 who would also benefit from READ 180 and System 44 Programs, their current schedules cannot accommodate the additional 40-minute period. We hope to incorporate READ 180 and System 44 into these students' schedules next year.

Professional Development

Teachers and administrators will continue to participate in Common Core Learning Standards training in all four content areas. They will engage in writing new curriculum aligned with the new Common Core Learning Standards and work together to create common assessments. With the assistance of our part-time staff developer/shared data expert, they will continue to enhance their understanding of data analysis to inform instruction. General education and special education teachers will work collaboratively to develop and implement lesson and unit plans that meet the individual needs of their students. They will be given time during built-in professional development periods, as well as grade level meetings to meet and collaborate.

We will continue to support high-quality professional development to teachers during our professional development periods, which are scheduled twice a week and built into the teacher's work day, as well as release days for training. Professional development activities and programs will focus on the new Common Core Learning Standards, NYSED 3-8 Assessments, Think Link, AlMSweb, Response to Intervention (Rtl), common assessments, consistent grading practices, data analysis, System 44, READ 180. New York State Education Department Race-to-the-Top (RTTT) turnkey training will be provided to teachers and administrators in Common Core ELA, Common Core Math, Inquiry Teams, and Teacher Evaluation, all of which will serve to build the capacity to strengthen teaching and learning in all classrooms.

In addition, Title I, Title II, IDEA 611, and District funding will enable teachers and administrators to attend on-site and out of district professional development training improve instruction and academic achievement. Teachers and administrators will turnkey what they learn at these workshops and conferences during our built-in professional development periods, grade level, and faculty meetings so that they can bring their learning back to their colleagues and ultimately into classrooms.

Teachers were trained during the 2010-2011 school year in how to implement the scientifically research based Zaner Bloser Writing Program. This effort will continue. In support of teachers' understanding of the new Common Core Learning Standards, teachers will also be trained in how to integrate the Common Core Reading and Writing Workshop Curricular Plans, which are being purchased this year. Music and art teachers will also attend Common Core English Language Arts Learning Standards Training so that they too can integrate reading and writing into their instructional programs. They will turnkey train their colleagues during weekly professional development periods.

1. Has the school seen any major changes over the past three years in the information that was analyzed? If so, please provide specific details here on these changes and how they are being addressed.

Although we have not seen any major changes over the past three years, we have seen a decrease in enrollment from 824 to 787 for the total student population in grades 3, 4, and 5 and a slight increase in the classification rate of SWD from 17.26% to 18.68%. To meet these challenges, we restructured the literacy block to reflect a more homogeneous grouping of students by reading levels. Rather than being grouped by grade level, self-contained students are grouped by reading levels. As a result, class sizes were slightly reduced to an average of twelve students rather than fifteen. We redistributed teacher aides so that each self-contained class also received the services of at least one teacher aide during the two-hour reading block.

With an increase in classification rate of SWD, there was also an increase in the classification rate of SWD who receive Related Services (speech, OT, PT, social skills, hearing itinerant services, and counseling). Unfortunately, the pull-outs for related services impacted continuity of instruction for those students during the two-hour literacy block, as well as other content area instruction. Pull-out services for related services impact instructional time in literacy, as well as other content area instruction. Students can be out of the classroom from 30 to 240 minutes/week.

Weekly pull-outs for speech services range from three to five days per week for both group and individual settings. Some SWD receive speech services using both settings during the week. For example, a student may receive speech five times a week in a group, plus another 2 times a week in individual one-on-one sessions with the speech teacher. This can account for 210 minutes of speech services for that particular student. To address this issue, speech teachers provide pushin services during the block where possible dependent upon student IEPs.

In addition, we would like to note that K-2 students in our feeder school, Frank J. Carasiti Elementary School can be out of the classroom from 30 to 420 minutes/week for related services.

Budgetary issues continue to impact the school district Class enrollment is near maximum allowed by the Rocky Point Teacher's contract with 27 students in a class for grades 3-5. Reduction in funding via aid from New York state and rising operating costs continue to stretch resources and limit the introduction of support programs for low performing students.

Planning for improving the academic achievement of the students served in Title I funded programs support Next S.T.E.P.—Next Strategies and Tactics for Educational Progress—the District's Five-Year Strategic Plan. The District's guiding goals of academic excellence, organizational development, and fiscal sustainability were developed through a collaboration of stakeholders representing all members of our learning community. The single focus of working together to improve outcomes for students drives our educational mission.

Improving the literacy achievement of Students with Disabilities, English as a Second Language, and at-risk students is the focus of our Title I Programs, which are supported through Academic Intervention Services, and Response to Intervention. Individual students are brought to IST, supported through Tier I, Tier II, and Tier III Intervention Programs.

- 3. How will the school use effective methods and instructional strategies that are based on scientifically based research that strengthen the core academic program of the school and that:
 - a. Give primary consideration to providing extended learning time, such as, extended school year, before/after school, and summer programs and opportunities:
 - b. Help provide an accelerated, high quality curriculum, including applied learning; and
 - c. Minimize removing children from the regular classroom during regular school hours;

Our strategic and intensive students need additional instructional time to catch up. They need to make more than a year's progress in half the time. The two-hour literacy block will help students with time on task in a structured and supportive literacy environment. We continue to meet with challenges of multiple pull-outs for students who need a myriad of special education supports and services. We are working hard to overcome these challenges. We have expanded our extended day programs to provide our students with additional instructional time and support before, during, and after school through individual and small group ICARE Tutoring. We also provide students with after school tutoring through our Late Bird Tutoring Program, as well as Summer Jump Start Tutoring Program.

Teachers and administrators will participate in Common Core Learning Standards training in all four content areas with a focus on literacy—to improve both reading and writing skills of all students. Teachers and administrators will engage in writing new curriculum aligned with the new Common Core Learning Standards and work together to create common assessments. With the assistance of our part-time staff developer/shared data expert, they will continue to enhance their understanding of data analysis to inform instruction. General education and special education teachers will work collaboratively to develop and implement lesson and unit plans that meet the individual needs of their students. They will be given time during built-in professional development periods, as well as grade level meetings to meet to collaborate. Teachers will also continue to use web-based, skills specific ThinkLink probes to provide targeted individual instruction to students based on specific reading skill deficiencies.

In addition to high quality curriculum, we are focusing on explicit and direct instruction so that our strategic and intensive learners have a chance to decode and comprehend text across content areas. Teachers and administrators at JAE and throughout the District will participate in professional conversations and professional development that focuses on the effective and scientifically research based methods and instructional strategies cited in APPENDIX 1 of the CEP Guidance Document. Teachers and administrators will review the Factors that Impact Student Performance. They will also review the data collected during JAE's School Quality Review (SQR), including the SESIS Walk-Through

data collected by SESIS Linda Chafkin. Teachers and administrators will review the *Summary of Classroom Visitations* document provided to the SQR Team, Valerie Valenti's *Summary of Suffolk County SESIS Walk-Throughs*, and JAE's SQR *Team's Summary of Findings and Recommendations Based on the 2011 SESIS Instructional Review of Classroom Visitations of Students with Disabilities in JAE, as well as data that will be collected during the next few months during additional walk-throughs of Consultant Teacher Direct (CTD)—inclusion, self-contained, and learning lab (resource room), AIS, and ESL classrooms, which will be conducted by district and building administrators using the RSE-TASC Walk-Through Observational Tool. Teachers will also participate in professional development and have the opportunity to collaborate and self-reflect on their own instructional practice using the Regional Special Education Technical Assistance Support Center's (RSE-TASC) <i>Quality Indicator Review and Resource Guides for Literacy.* Teachers will be encouraged to incorporate these effective methods and instructional strategies that the NYSED and RSE-TASC cited to be effective with special education students in all placements.

4. Coordinate with and support the regular educational program;

To address student deficits on the NYSED Grades 3-8 ELA Assessments, as well as meet the demands of the new Common Core Learning Standards, instruction in third through fifth grade will focus on using specific evidence and textual support, building vocabulary knowledge and usage, identifying main idea and details, and strengthening command of standard English grammar.

Results on ThinkLink, a standardized assessment given to students three times per year, demonstrated similar deficiencies as the NYSED ELA Assessment. Further, ThinkLink, AIMSweb, and classroom assessment data indicate that Students with Disabilities have severe deficits with vocabulary and complex language acquisition, as well as with understanding and using complex and compound sentences in their written and oral language. In addition, based on AIMSweb, SLOSSON, and Schlegel results, classroom instruction will now focus on enhancing students' decoding and fluency skills. Teachers will continue to implement web-based, skills specific ThinkLink probes to provide targeted individual instruction to students based on specific reading skill deficiencies. AIMSweb progress monitoring probes will provide us with individual formative assessment data to guide student instruction.

While the majority of teachers will continue to use the Literacy Collaborative Framework to provide literacy instruction, some teachers will also use two additional reading programs this year. Students who received a level score of 1 or 2 on the ELA and cannot decode will participate in System 44, while students who can decode will participate in READ 180 (paid for by funds from IDEA Part B Section 611 Sub Grant). Other students will participate in Wilson Fundations or the Wilson Language Program. Students will be assessed to determine which program will best suit their individual needs. Providing these scientifically research based reading intervention programs to students will enable us to differentiate instruction based upon student needs.

We have also expanded our English Language Arts Program this year. We now have a scheduled 2-hour Literacy Block (uninterrupted except for occasional mandated support services such as Speech, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, English as a Second Language, social skills training, and education and autism counseling itinerant services) for students in grades three through five. During this two-hour literacy block, Students with Disabilities in self-contained classes are now grouped for instruction based on reading level regardless of age or grade level. We are also integrating Core Knowledge Libraries, which include social studies, science, and math content area reading texts during English Language Arts instruction across all classrooms in grades 3-5. Additionally, all teachers will also integrate Laura Robb libraries, which include fictional and information leveled texts into guided reading instruction.

As per BEDS Report, all teachers are highly qualified and appropriately certified to provide instruction in ELA, AIS, READ 180, and System 44 Literacy instruction.

6. Provide professional development opportunities for teachers, principals and paraprofessionals including, if appropriate, pupil services personnel, parents, and other staff;

The Director of Instruction meets and communicates regularly with building principals, Instructional Coordinators, Coordinator of Special Education, Director of Special Education, and Chairs to develop and schedule high quality professional development activities for staff, which are delivered twice a week during professional development periods that are built into the teachers' work day. Professional development activities support Next S.T.E.P.—the Superintendent's five-year strategic plan. Three-person building teams representing each building participate in one to two days of RTTT Inquiry Team training for ELA, math, and data. Five administrators are participating in nine days of teacher evaluation training. ES BOCES Network Teams are providing all of the RTTT training. The Executive Director of Educational Services and Assistant Superintendent are attending principal evaluation training. All teacher and administrator attendees will serve as turnkey trainers for their colleagues. The implementation of scientifically research based programs to improve the literacy skills of strategic and intensive learners is supported through on-going, intensive professional development. During the first year of implementation, READ 180 and System 44 teachers will participate in 3 full days of training, 2 full days of collaborative planning, and five individual non-evaluative coaching sessions by a Scholastic trainer.

Teachers and administrators will continue to participate in Common Core Learning Standards training in all four content areas. They will engage in writing new curriculum aligned with the new Common Core Learning Standards and work together to create common assessments. With the assistance of our part-time staff developer/shared data expert, they will continue to enhance their understanding of data analysis to inform instruction. General education and special education teachers will work collaboratively to develop and implement lesson and unit plans that meet the individual needs of their students. They will be given time during built-in professional development periods, as well as grade level meetings to meet to collaborate and reflect on their own professional practices. Teachers will also continue to use web-based, skills specific ThinkLink probes to provide targeted individual instruction to students based on specific reading skill deficiencies.

Along with all of these grants, general funds supported the purchase of additional student materials and the necessary technology—computers, CD players, and headsets with microphones. This District initiative, designed to improve the literacy achievement of for our intensive learners, was a coordinated effort across buildings and between the Office of Instruction and Office of Special Education. Providing students and teachers with the means and support to decode and comprehend text is critical to the success of these students in school and in life.

2. Describe the teacher-mentoring program that will be incorporated as part of the school's strategy for providing high-quality professional development.

Rocky Point Union Free School District's New Teacher Mentoring Program is in place for new probationary teachers and regular substitute teachers who have not yet received mentoring in a previous district. Teachers participate in fifteen hours of professional development for which they receive one in-service course credit. These after-school workshops are led by administrators across the district who provide specific workshops designed to support teacher development and retention. Participating teachers are also matched with a teacher mentor who provides non-evaluative coaching and support.

In addition, K-2nd grade teachers in Frank J. Carasiti Elementary School and 3rd – 5th grade teachers in Joseph A. Edgar Intermediate School participate in continuous and on-going professional development workshops and coaching in Literacy Collaborative, a scientifically research based Core Literacy Program by a Literacy Collaborative Coordinator and/or Response to Intervention Reading Coach.

Parents and guardians of students who attend Joseph A. Edgar Intermediate School were notified of the school's Improvement Year 1 status via a District letter that was mailed to each home.
